

Poetry Terms

Alliteration: When two or more words have the same beginning sound. (Sally sells seashells by the seashore.)

Hyperbole: A deliberate exaggeration. (I am a million miles from home.)

Metaphor: Making a comparison between two unlike things by saying one thing *is* another. (Love is a red, red rose.)

Onomatopoeia: Words which imitate sounds. (Buzz, hiss, meow.)

Rhyme: The same or similar sounds at the end of two or more words. (The cat sat on the mat.)

Simile: Making a comparison between two unlike things using the words *like* or *as*. (Love is like a red, red rose.)

Stanza: Two or more lines of a poem, that, together, form a division of the poem.



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
